# Project Descriptions


While at Alameda County I worked to increase the amount of compostable and recyclable material diverted from the landfill, thereby reducing greenhouse gases emitted.

## 1: Increase Infrastructure

- Completed site assessments, waste audits, and interviews to understand facility needs
- Designed new waste enclosures
- Coordinated program implementation with building occupants, janitorial staff, and waste haulers to balance the needs of each stakeholder and create individual plans for each site
- Added new indoor and outdoor bins, signs, and stickers

## 2: Outreach

- Trained many different stakeholders in Alameda County facilities on how to correctly sort
  waste into compost and recycling bins and why it is important to do so (stakeholders
  included janitors, employees from numerous agencies, incarcerated youth, and members
  of the public)
- Created outreach materials such as signs and stickers
- Developed teaching materials for youth and janitorial staff

## 1: Increase Infrastructure

- Rolled out the program to a projected
   14 new buildings
- Refreshed 6 additional buildings
